Increasing students’ sensitivity to local needs and problems and putting them in the global concerns, constraints and opportunities. Examples of solutions arrived at in different contexts.

Eg. Nile Purification Project successfully carried out in Egypt can be related to Ganga Purification Project.

Including Action for Change

- Small actions to bring about change.
- Personal → local →→ global
- Strategies used for sensitization: games, role-play, stories, scientific inquiries or simple activities.

Developing Sustainable Practices

- Encourage those practices that are enduring incorporate into the curriculum focus on exposing the students to socio-cultural realities of life, bringing in a new dimension of social relevance.

Steps to Introduce Global Perspectives through Curriculum:

Three key concepts can be identified

- Locate plug points in the science curriculum
- Collect data/ information (both local and global)
- Design participatory methods/approaches
- Use appropriate strategies to further sensitize students to the issue
- Decide on small action-student initiative.

Steps to Include Global Perspectives through Teaching

- Identify 2-3 key concepts
- Identify issues and problems related to science curriculum (plug points)
- Collect data/ information about the identified issue (local and global-newspapers, magazines, internet, published newsletters by NGOs, other voluntary organizations, books etc.
- Design participatory methods to teaching to put across facts/content. Take help of experts if necessary.
- Use appropriate strategies to further sensitize the students
- Decide on small actions that can be undertaken with student initiative.
